HOW TO USE THIS MAP

- Trails & shared use paths**
The ultimate low-stress experience. Multi-use and generally separated from cars, traffic and pedestrians when biking on these routes.
- Low-stress routes**
These routes are "hot spots" with less traffic and slower speed limits. These routes bypass busy roadways to get you away from cars.
- Use with caution routes**
To make key connections, we've included some streets that are a little busier. You may notice you have some experience. We've also marked a great trail for a test ride.
- Bike lane**
- Shared road/sharrow**
Our region still has some work to do in this department. Bike lanes have traditionally been installed where they fit or make through holes, not necessarily where they feel comfortable to ride. Consider these routes as "use with caution" routes.
- Walk on sidewalk**
If you're a beginner, we recommend walking your bike on the sidewalk in some cases to help guide through a particularly treacherous area. In most of our local communities, it's prohibited to "ride" your bike on the sidewalk.
- Low-stress hills**
A certain neighborhood in this town. Chances are parking spots, as you accordingly. Hire. No bus and the bike is a make one year friend.
- Use with caution hills**
These hills may be too treacherous for beginners to climb, but you might want to know about it if you're comfortable riding your bike.
- One-way streets**
Across parts in the direction of one-way streets, always ride your bike in the direction of traffic in the street.
- Mountain bike trailhead**

BRIDGES

- 1. Reading Suspension Bridge** - Walk your bike on the path on either side of the historic bridge. If you can't bike with locks, be careful on the gridded metal deck, and avoid riding down because it gets hot!
- 2. Taylor Soulegate Bridge** - If you're coming from Cincinnati, cross the east or west path depending on what side you want to head on in Newport. It's a cobblestone ride to cross the area in the roundabout on the Kentucky side.
- 3. Purple People Bridge** - This is easily our favorite bridge to ride. It's the only designated bike/pedestrian bridge over the Ohio River. Follow the crosswalk signal to reach Newport side, because there is no bike traffic light facing the bridge.
- 4. KY 7 / Fourth Street Bridge** - This is the most direct route between downtown Newport and Covington, but it can be less accessible for beginners. Cars tend to drive fast, and it's a tight squeeze if you're walking your bike on the narrow sidewalks. Use with caution!
- 5. 11th/12th Street / Old Social Bridge** - There's plenty of room to take the time when riding on this bridge, but cars tend to come fast. Use with caution to walk your bike on the sidewalk.



NORTHERN KY REGIONAL TRAILS

LEBANON-COUNTYSIDE YMCA TRAIL
This rail-trail spans north of the Little Miami Scenic Trail near Mason, traversing 11 miles into downtown Lebanon.

LITTLE MIAMI SCENIC TRAIL
Also known as the "Cleveland Bike Trail", this rail-trail traverses 78 miles from Lunken Airport in Cincinnati to Springfield, Ohio. It's the backbone leg of the Ohio to Erie Trail, which extends 320-miles to Cleveland.

GREAT MIAMI RIVER TRAIL
From Middletown, this trail connects 77 miles through Dayton to Ripon. Another 11 miles extends between Fortfield and Hamilton. Plans are in the works to connect this trail through Taylor County.

DEARBORN TRAIL
This trail meanders roughly 6 miles along the Ohio River through the historic river towns of Lawrenceburg and Aurora.

KY 237 TRAIL
This path connects 10 miles from suburban Boone County to CIVI International Airport. Plans are in the works to build out a loop trail around the airport.

ESSENTIALS FOR RIDING

- Wear a raincoat.
- Dress to be seen.
- Ride with front & rear lights.
- Check your A/C, Air, Riders, Clean.

BE SAFE & SMART

- No handhelds for phone while riding.
- Lock your bike. Have with you.
- Don't park in door zone, park in protected areas.
- Cross streets, roads at 90°.
- Always wear a seat belt, never drink and ride.
- Kick out & ring bell to pass pedestrians.
- Ride carefully around children & dogs.

RIDE LIKE A VEHICLE ON THE ROAD

- Ride predictably, with hand signals.
- Follow the rules of the road.
- Don't ride against traffic.
- Be in the middle of the travel lane.
- Cars are required to give 3' clearance.
- Always wear your seat belt, please don't drink and ride.
- Make your blue on the sidewalk.

THE CROWN

One of Tri-State Trails signature projects in the urban core is the CROWN, which is a vision to connect the Little Miami Scenic Trail, Wasson Way, Ohio River Trail, and Mill Creek Greenway Trail. When complete, the CROWN will surround Cincinnati's urban core with a 34-mile multi-use trail loop. More than 350,000 residents across six communities will be connected to the best that our city has to offer - employment centers, parks, schools, attractions, and more.

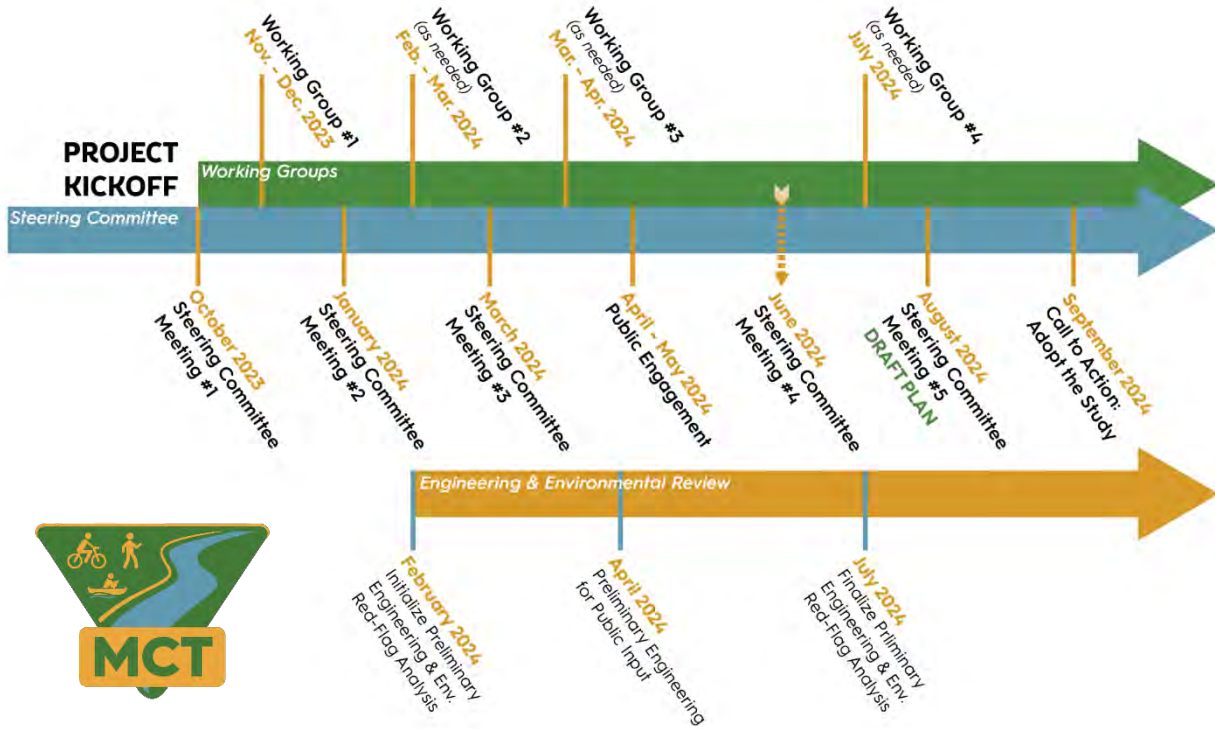
PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Mill Creek Triangle Trail is a vision for a 40+ mile shared use trail network in the heart of Hamilton County, throughout the Mill Creek watershed.

The vision for the Mill Creek Triangle Trail is to create an equitable transportation and recreation amenity that connects residential neighborhoods to the Mill Creek; to local business districts and key destinations; to Great Parks' regional greenspaces like Winton Woods, Glenwood Gardens, and Sharon Woods; and to the planned CROWN 34-mile trail loop in Cincinnati.

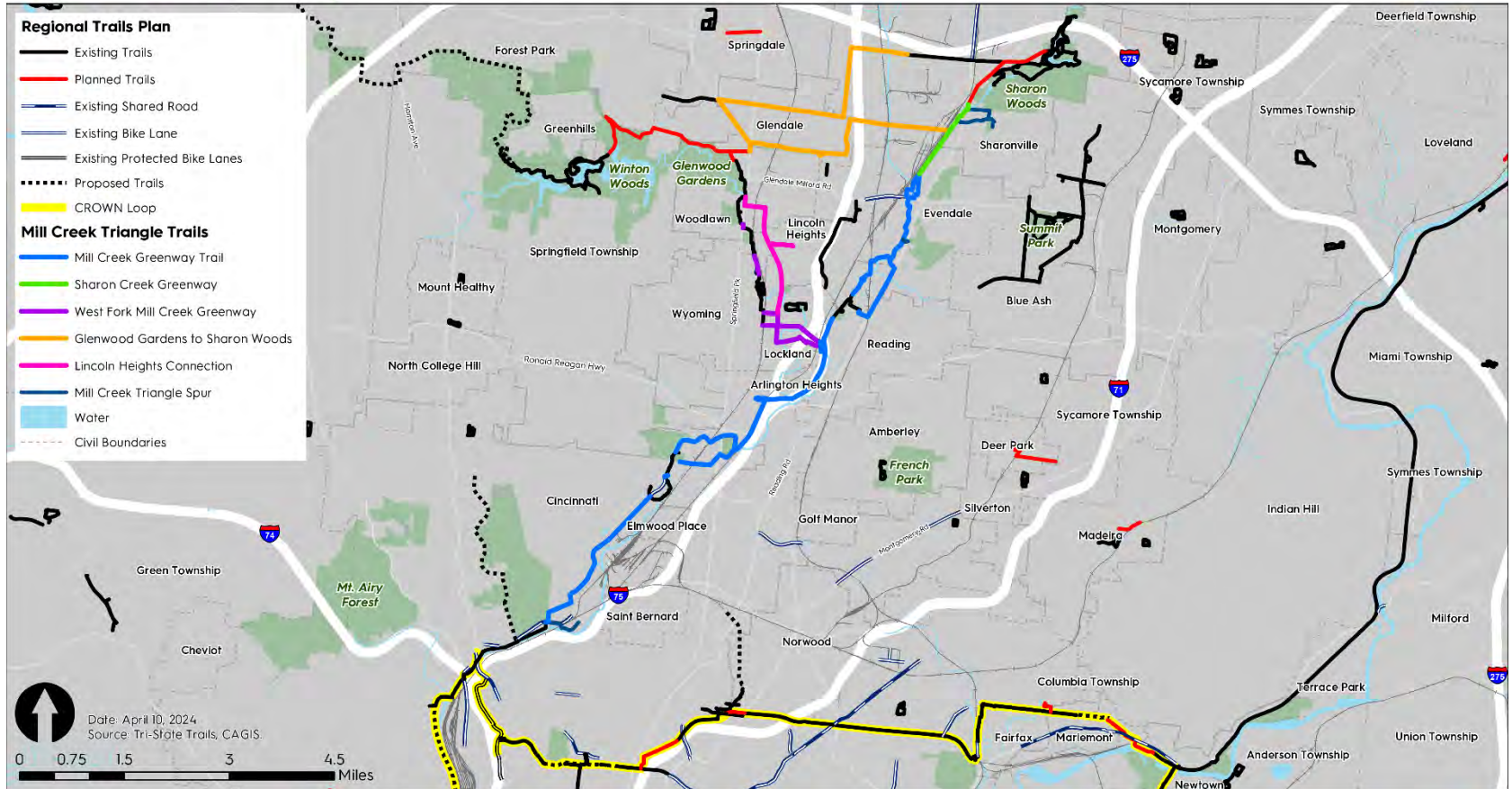

Mill Creek Triangle Trail Feasibility Study Objectives

1. Form an active transportation network in the center of Hamilton County
2. Explore trail alignment options and recommend a preferred route
3. Develop cost estimates for the preferred route and alternatives
4. Conduct public engagement for the proposed Mill Creek Triangle Trail
5. Position trail segments to apply for federal and state grant funding for construction



Project Overview

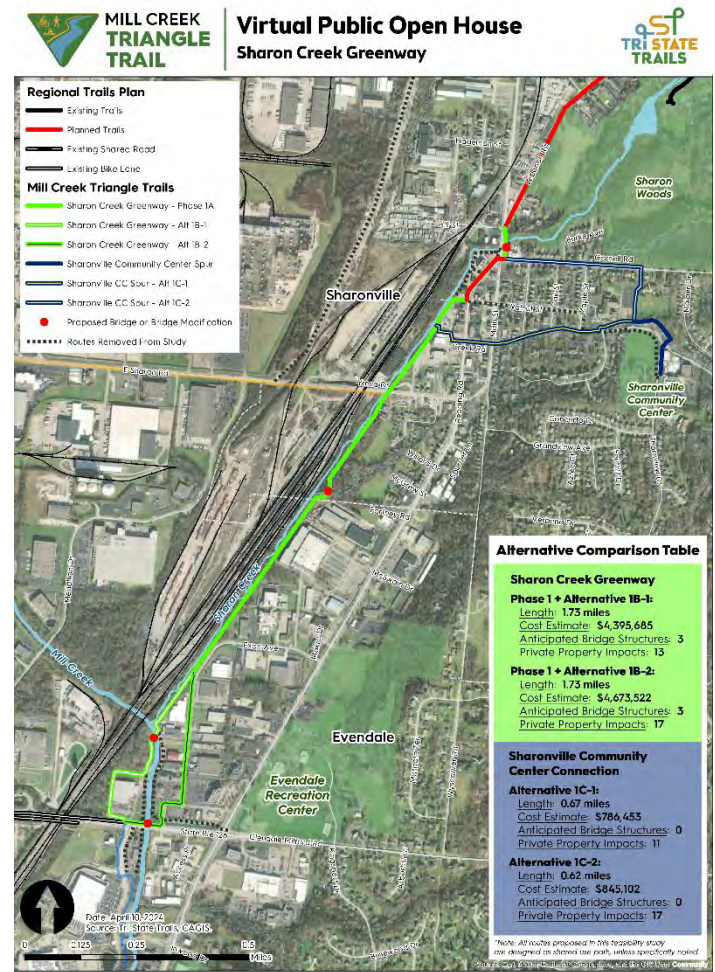
The Mill Creek Triangle Trail is a vision for a 40+ mile regional trail network in central and northern Hamilton County, throughout the Mill Creek watershed. The concept for the Mill Creek Triangle Trail dates back to Tri-State Trails' 2014 Regional Trails Plan. Through the Connecting Active Communities Coalition, project partners have been convening since 2016 to advance various sections of the trail network. To date, approximately 13.5 miles of the network have been constructed. An additional 4.3 miles of the network are funded to be constructed in the near future.

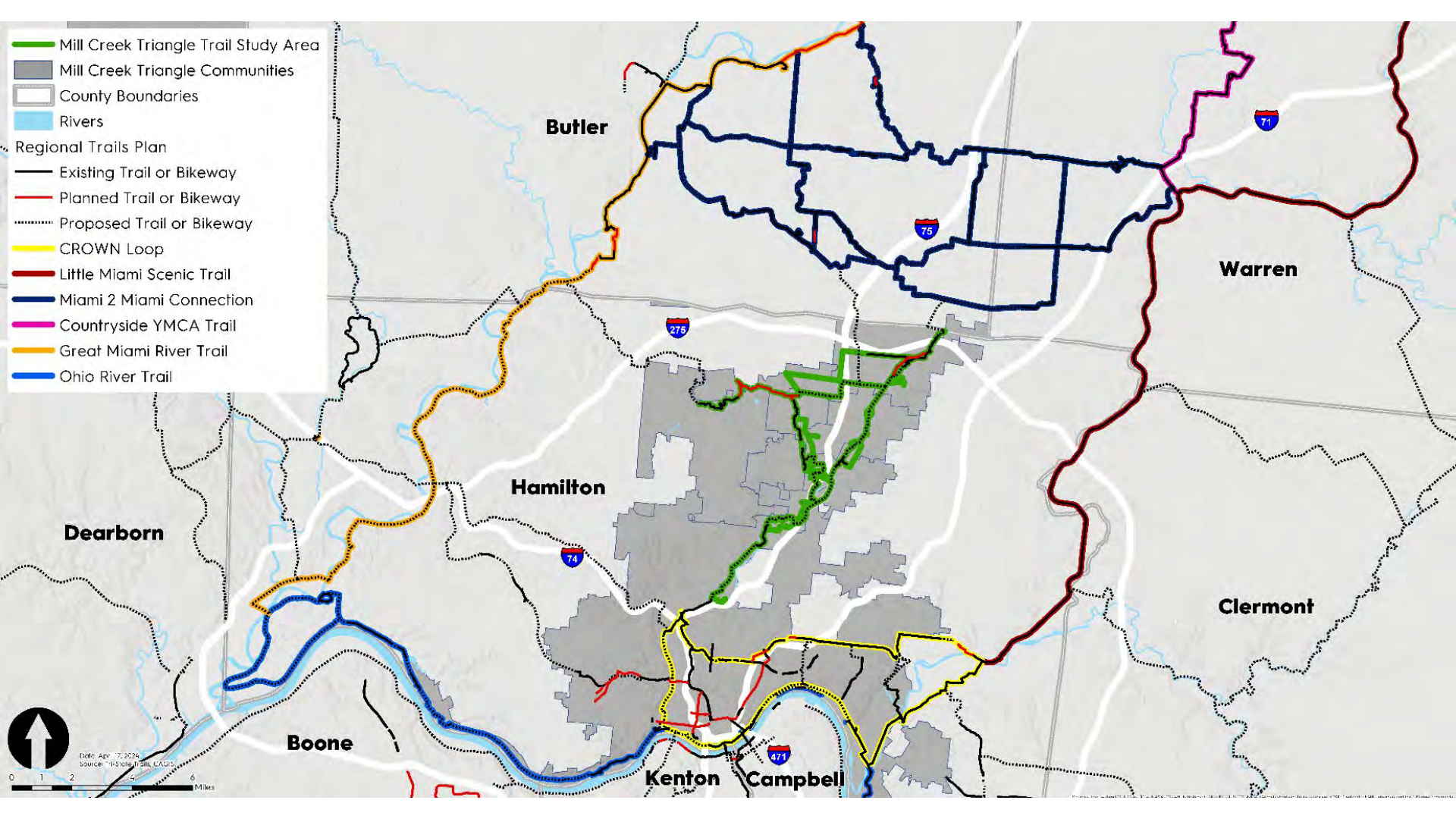
Throughout 2023, Tri-State Trails raised the funds from project partners to perform this feasibility study for the Mill Creek Triangle Trail. The feasibility study will recommend a preferred trail alignment and preliminary engineering cost estimates that can be used to apply for grants to build the trail in sections. The project team for the study includes Tri-State Trails (planning and project management), Arcadis (engineering consultant), and Lawson & Associates (environmental economists). The feasibility study began in October 2023 and is guided by a steering committee made up of project partners. The steering committee developed the following vision statement for the Mill Creek Triangle Trail:

"The Mill Creek Triangle Trail will create a safe and accessible 40+ mile shared-use trail network in central Hamilton County, ultimately joining to the regional trail network. By linking fourteen communities, the Triangle Trail will provide an equitable transportation and recreation amenity that reconnects residents to the natural environment of the Mill Creek watershed and encourages more active, healthier lifestyles. Through collaboration and partnerships, the Triangle Trail will be a well-maintained, highly utilized socio-economic catalyst that fosters a sense of wellbeing and community pride."

Great Miami River Trail Advancements in Butler County

Metro Parks of Butler County:

- 2022: Completed 0.6-mile extension in Rentschler Forest and awarded \$1.1M from OKI to construct 1.7-mile gap between Trenton Trailhead and northern terminus of Monroe's project - 2025 Construction
- 2024: Awarded \$1.7M from OKI to construct extension from Rentschler Forest to Monroe Bicentennial Commons Park. Butler County Commissioners leveraged \$2.5M in ARPA funds to advance this 3.1-mile gap - 2026 Construction

City of Fairfield:

- 2024: Awarded \$750,000 from OKI to close gaps between Waterworks Park, Marsh Park, and FurField Dog Park, resulting in a 2.5-mile southward extension - 2026 Construction

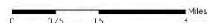
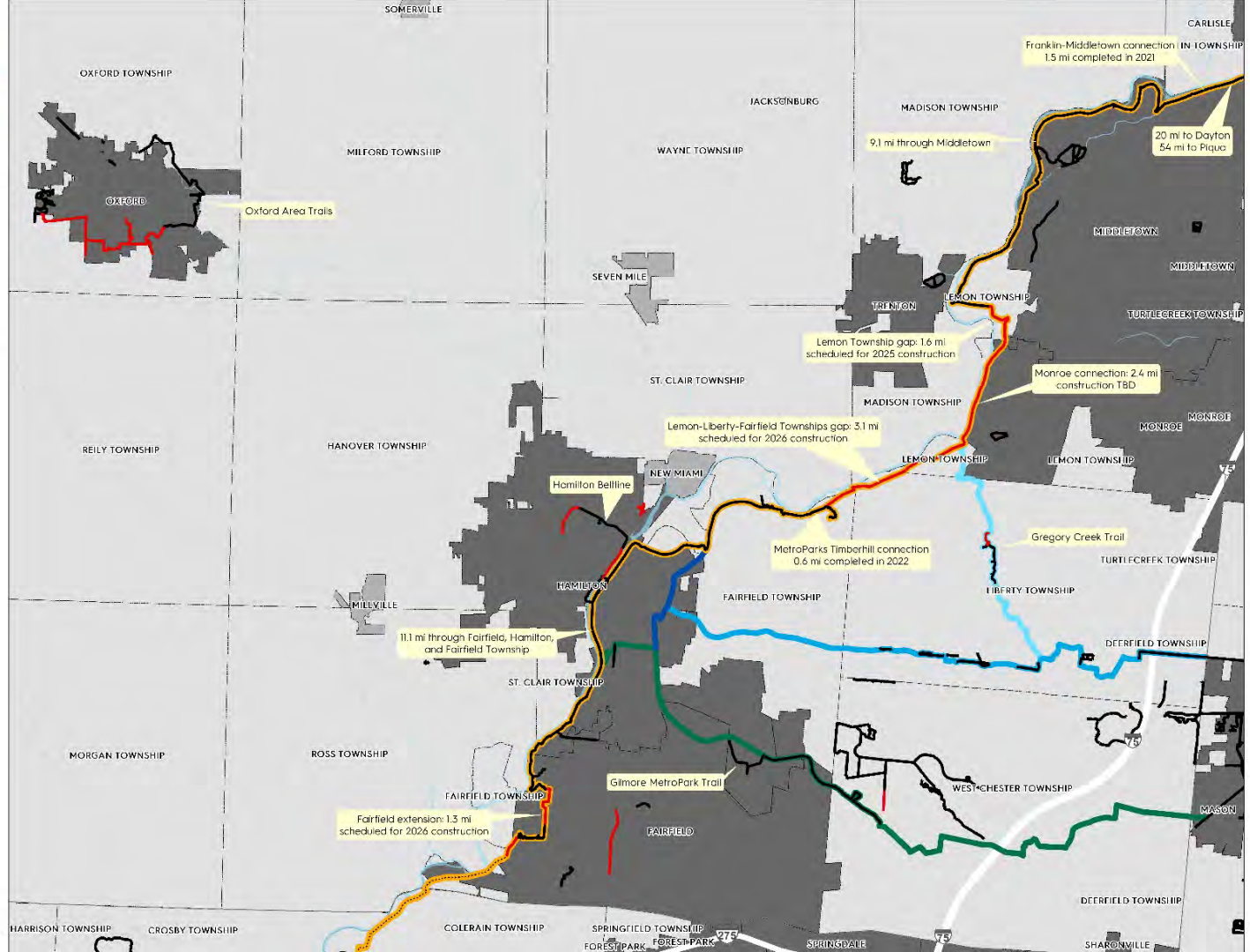

Rentschler Forest MetroPark - Great Miami River Trail

- An additional 0.6-miles of GMRT trail constructed by MetroParks opened in Rentschler Forest in 2022.
- The total project cost was approximate \$1.25 Million with actual construction cost was just over \$1 million dollars
- Resting pads were added in the design to slopes to allow for ADA compliance
- One large pre-cast arch culvert stream crossing
- Partially Grant funded using Clean Ohio Trails and ODOT Safety Grants.
- Project completed close to original schedule and with minimal change orders.

Gilmore Ponds MetroPark – Miami 2 Miami Trail

- An additional 1.5-miles of trail constructed by MetroParks opened in Gilmore Ponds MetroPark in 2023 with four canal crossings
- The total cost was over \$2.3 million with actual construction cost just under \$2 million dollars
- Collaboration between MetroParks of Butler County, City of Hamilton, and Butler County Engineers
- Won NACPRO award in 2023 Trails and Corridors Award; funding split at a designated trail intersection
- Performed concurrently with a natural gas pipeline/sewer relocation project within the Park in order to minimize disturbance intervals
- Funding Sources: 65% Federal Grants, 15% State Grants, 13% MetroParks, 7% City of Hamilton
- Project completed close to original schedule and with minimal change orders.

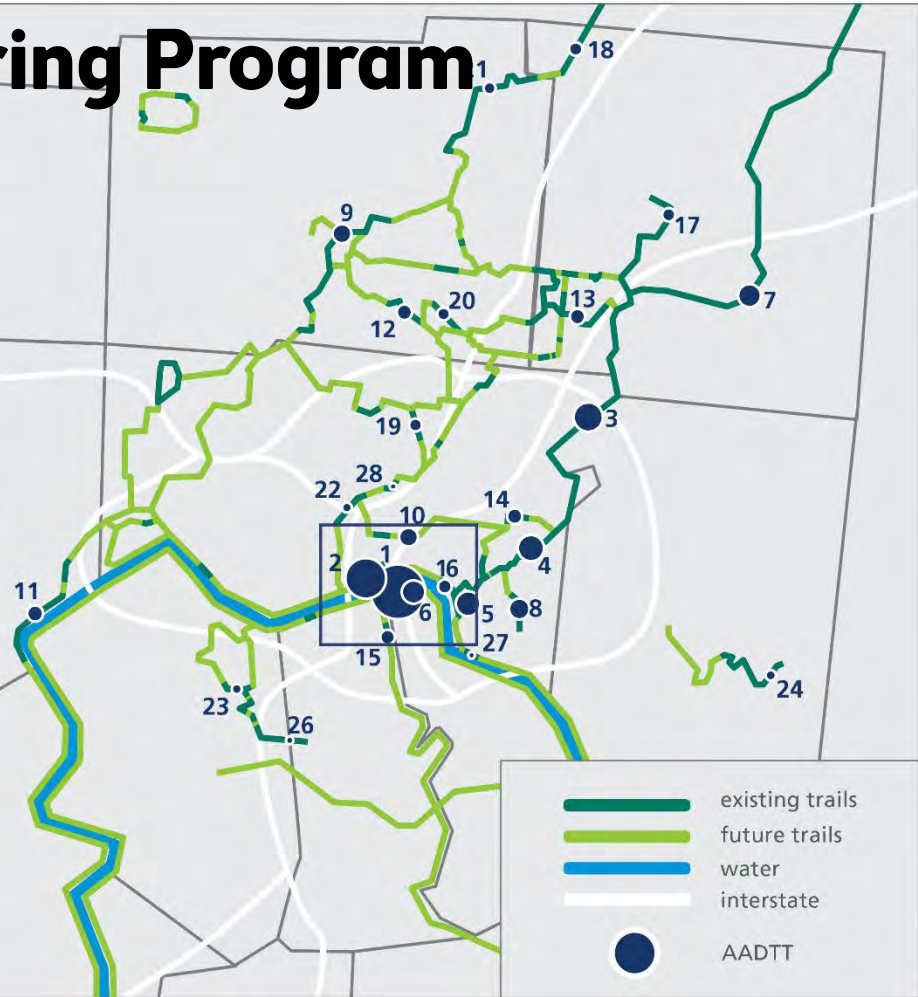
