The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's Institute Steering Committee met on Friday, July 26, 2024 at 9:30 a.m. at MVRPC, 10 N. Ludlow St., Suite 700, Dayton, Ohio 45402. All members and news media were notified of the meeting pursuant to the Sunshine Law.

I. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Chairperson Joseph called the meeting to order at 9:33 a.m. Self-introductions were made.

II. APPROVAL OF APRIL 26, 2024 MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Hankins made a motion to approve the minutes from the April 26, 2024 Institute Steering Committee meeting. Mr. Housh seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT ON ACTION ITEMS

None.

IV. RPC (REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Resolution 24-023: Approving the 2024 Age-Friendly Responsive Grants

Ms. Kastner announced that the City of Trotwood, a member organization of MVRPC, has applied for an Age-Friendly Community Responsive Grant from the Del Mar Health-Dayton Fund at The Dayton Foundation. This grant focuses on developing and implementing action plans to enhance age-friendly initiatives. She highlighted Trotwood's progress, including ADA accessibility improvements like sidewalks, ramps, and public facilities, as well as new affordable housing for older adults. The city has also provided consistent recreational and educational programming tailored to older adults' needs.

Looking ahead, future priorities for Trotwood's age-friendly improvements will include:

Expanding transportation routes with more age-friendly seating at bus stops.
Enhancing city park amenities by adding age-friendly exercise equipment.
Improving communication and information dissemination to ensure accessibility and clarity for all.

Ms. Kastner recommended forwarding the 2024 Age-Friendly Community Responsive Grant application to the MVRPC Board of Directors for approval. Ms. Wallace made a motion to motion to forward the application to the Board of Directors. Ms. Byrge seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

V. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Age-Friendly Story Map

Ms. King introduced Robin Lambert, MVRPC's summer intern, to present their work on a Story Map highlighting the Miami Valley Age-Friendly Communities. Robin explained that the map showcases the communities involved in the Regional Livable and Age-Friendly Communities Initiative, each of which has received funding through the Del Mar Healthcare Fund to participate in a multi-year process of developing plans and policies aligned with the mission of AARP's Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities. The communities featured include Bellbrook, Brookville, Centerville, Dayton, Harrison Township, Huber Heights, Kettering, Miami County, Vandalia, Washington Township, Xenia, Yellow Springs, and eventually Trotwood.

The Story Map will display the year each community enrolled as an Age-Friendly Community, total population, population over 65 and under 18, and the current stage of their program. Additionally, the map will provide links to each community's website and the AARP website. Robin also mentioned that the Story Map is still under development, with ongoing feedback from the Age-Friendly cohort and the Institute Steering Committee. The website is expected to be active and available to the public in the fall.

We are pleased to announce that two MVRPC member organizations, the City of Beavercreek and Beavercreek Township, have both applied for a First Year Age-Friendly Community Responsive Grant from the DMH-Dayton Fund at The Dayton Foundation. These grants will provide support for communities starting Phase 1 of the AARP Livable, Age-Friendly Communities multi-year planning initiative. Below is a summary of the proposals submitted by each applicant:

Community: City of Beavercreek

Project Description: The City of Beavercreek is seeking funding to conduct a community needs assessment to identify and address the requirements for becoming a more age-friendly community. This assessment is an important first step in developing future projects that will improve the quality of life for residents.

The City plans to collaborate with Beavercreek Township to expand age-friendly initiatives across Greene County. The Township’s portion of the assessment is estimated at \$20,000, based on population size and previous studies. Together, the City of Beavercreek and Beavercreek Township, which share a Senior Center, aim to conduct a comprehensive community needs assessment to secure an age-friendly designation for the entire area. This partnership will allow for resource sharing and joint development of strategies to meet the needs of the aging population. Additionally, learning from the experiences of other communities that have already gone through this process will help both entities allocate funds more effectively.

Recommended Grant Amount: \$20,000



Community: Beavercreek Township

Project Description: Beavercreek Township is seeking funding to conduct a community needs assessment aimed at identifying and addressing the requirements for becoming a more age-friendly community. This assessment represents a critical first step toward achieving age-friendliness, laying the groundwork for future projects that will enhance the quality of life for residents. The Township intends to collaborate with the City of Beavercreek to extend the scope of age-friendly initiatives across Greene County. Based on population size and prior studies, the estimated cost for Beavercreek Township's portion of the assessment is \$20,000.

By partnering with the City of Beavercreek and the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission, Beavercreek Township will ensure that older residents have access to a wider range of resources and services. This collaboration will help guarantee that seniors are not excluded from existing services and will improve the overall support network available to them within the community.

WHEREAS, with generous support from the Del Mar Health-Dayton Fund at The Dayton Foundation, the MVRPC Institute for Livable & Equitable Communities announced availability of responsive grants to MVRPC member communities, designed to support enrollment and advancement through in the AARP program to enhance livable and age-friendly initiatives within their communities; and

WHEREAS, the grants are awarded to both city of Beaver creek and Beaver creek Township MVRPC member communities for \$20,000 each to support the first year of a multi-year planning effort that recognizes and enhances age-friendly, livable aspects of communities; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Institute Steering Committee voted during their meeting on Friday, October 25, 2024 to recommend full funding for the amount requested for the 2024 Age-Friendly Community Responsive Grant; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors hereby concurs with the Institute for Livable and Equitable Communities to approve funding for the City of Beaver creek and Beaver creek Township to join the Miami Valley Age-Friendly Network, as outlined in the attached memo.

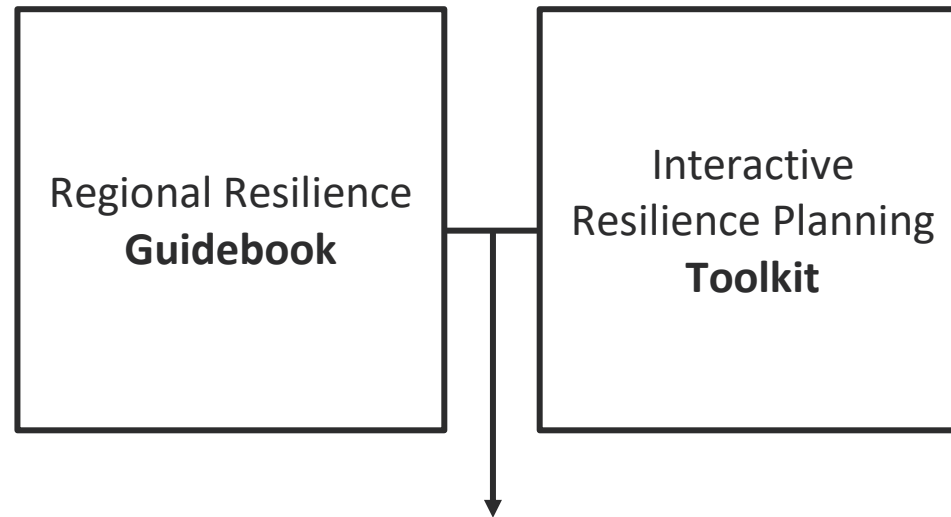

MVRPC Regional Goals

1. Increase public awareness.

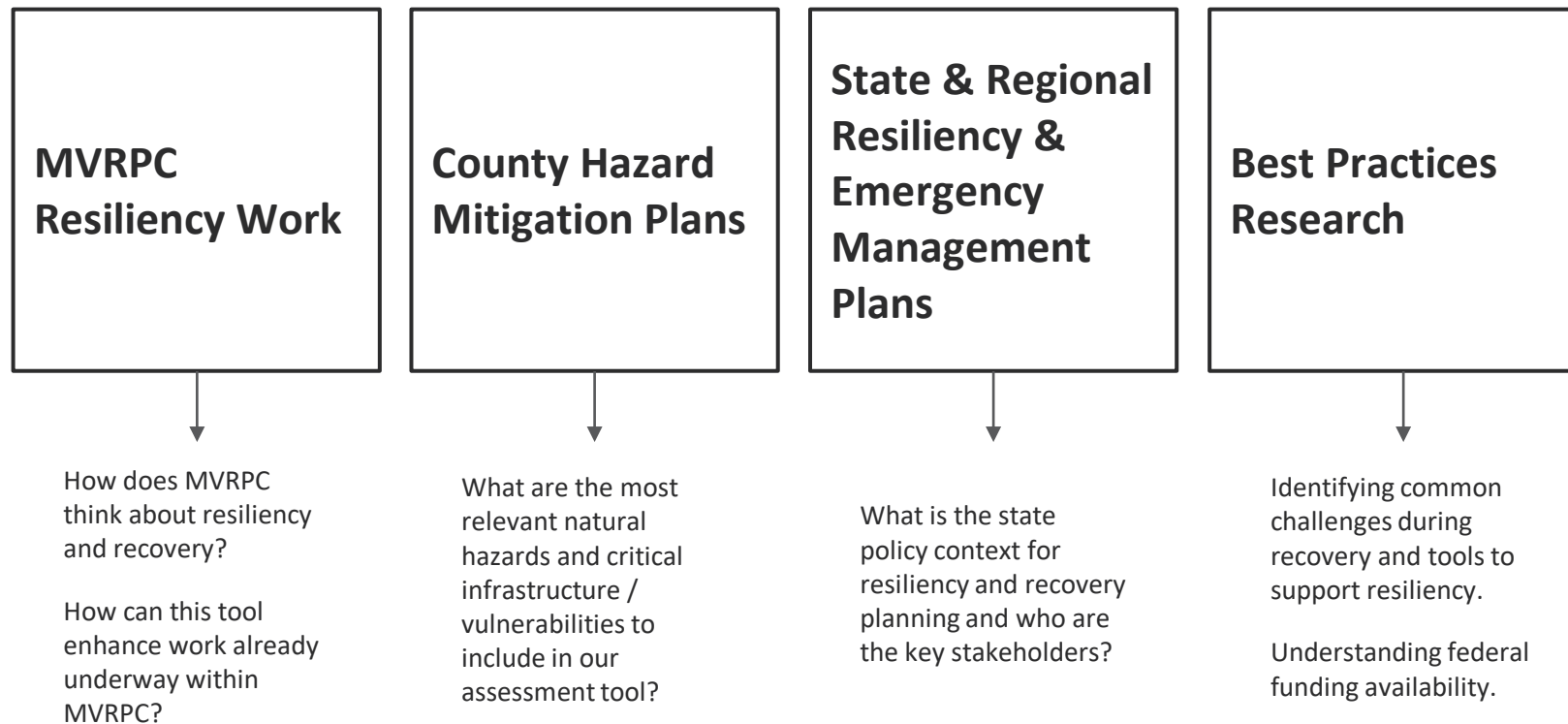

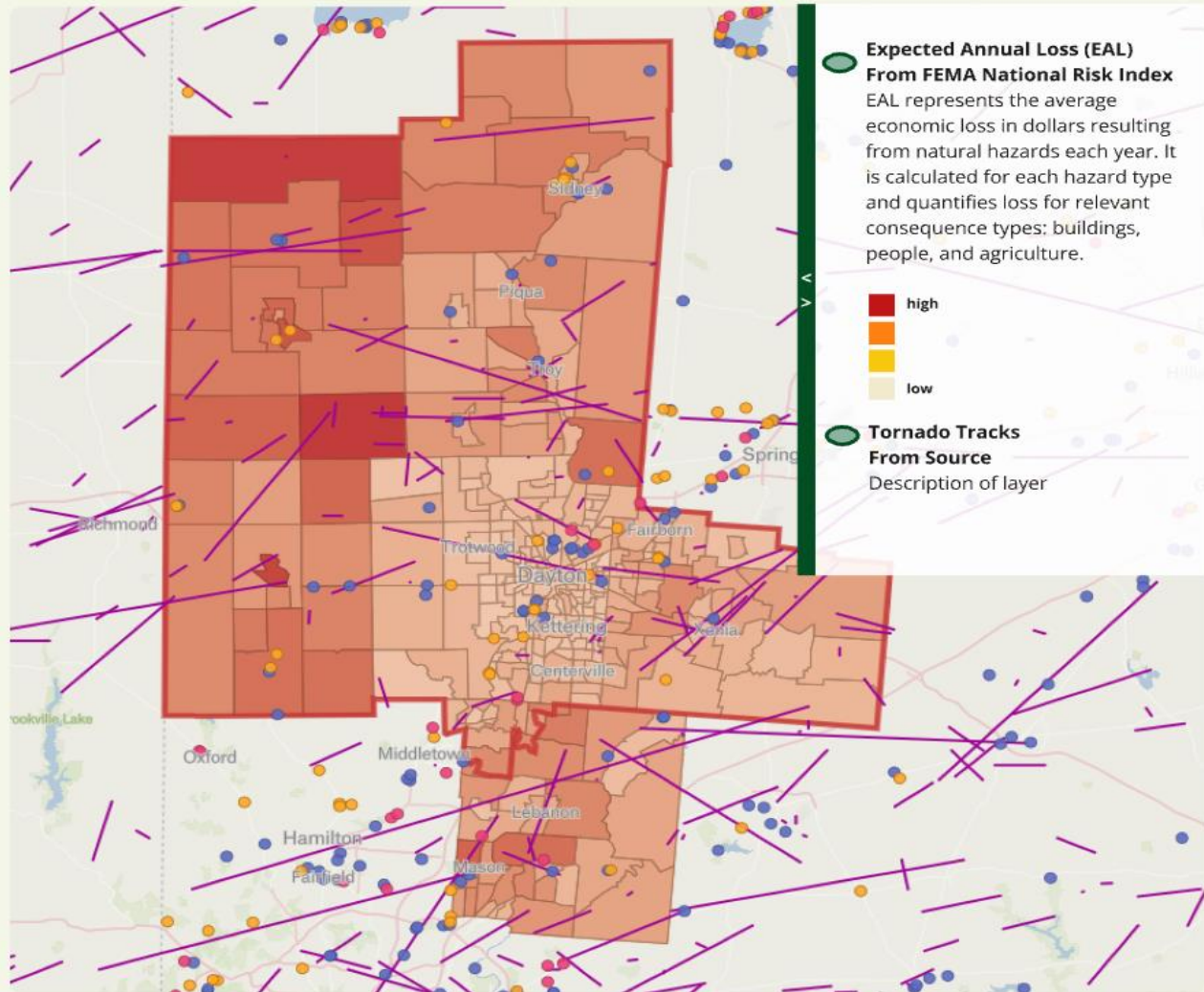

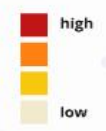

Tornado risk poses significant challenges to regional resiliency, particularly in areas prone to severe weather events. The sudden and destructive nature of tornadoes can lead to substantial property damage, loss of life, and disruptions to essential services. This can displace communities and strain community resiliency. Additionally, tornadoes can disrupt economic activities and critical supply chains, making recovery efforts more complex and prolonged. Enhancing regional resiliency involves implementing robust building codes, developing effective early warning systems, and ensuring comprehensive disaster preparedness plans.

- TORNADOS GOVERNANCE**
Adopt stringent building codes to enhance structural integrity
- TORNADOS EMERGENCY RESPONSE MANAGEMENT**
Early warning technologies and community preparedness programs



