## I. INTRODUCTION

Chairperson Gruner called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. Self-introductions were made.

### II. APPROVAL OF OCTOBER 21, 2021 MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Hibner made a motion to approve the minutes. Ms. Rhoades seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#### III. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD ON ACTION ITEMS

None

# IV. RPC (REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION ITEMS)

### A. GRMI Annual Review and Plan Update and Amendment

Ms. Baxter presented an update regarding the Greater Region Mobility Initiative (GRMI) Annual Plan. She provided a brief background of the Initiative and stated the GRMI was created to reduce duplication and fill gaps in transportation services geared to assist individuals with disabilities, lower income and older adults. ODOT sought to organize the provision of transportation services into regions. The Miami Valley Region is classified as Region 2 which serves the following counties: Champaign, Clark, Darke, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, Preble

and Shelby. The GRMI plan was adopted by the counties in September 2020 and the MVRPC Board of Directors in November 2020. Per ODOT guidance, each regional coordinated transportation plan is required to be updated annually and revised every four years. MVRPC serves as the Regional Coordinating Agency (RCA) and works in partnership with the county transportation planning committees on the annual plan review progress. Each county's transportation planning committee held a meeting to review unmet needs for their individual county. Three counties identified a need for changes: Champaign, Clark and Darke County. Letters of Support were submitted to the RCA by the three County Commissions acknowledging changes. Ms. Baxter stated that staff recommends forwarding the Resolution to adopt the Greater Region Transportation coordination plan annual review and plan amendment to the Board of Directors.

Mr. Hankins made a motion to recommend forwarding to the Board of Directors for adoption. Mr. Bales seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

# **B. Wayne Lakes FPA Amendment**

Mr. Lindsay presented an update regarding the Wayne Lakes FPA Amendment. He provided a brief background on the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan (AWQMP) and stated that in 2015 MVRPC completed a Sanitary Sewer Feasibility Study which provided assistance to five communities to develop general plans for sanitary sewers. The five communities assisted were: Wayne Lakes, Ludlow Falls, Jackson Township, Glenwood and Bowersville. Mr. Lindsay explained since 2015 Wayne Lakes has established a village sewer committee which has continued planning for sanitary sewers in the Village. The Village of Wayne Lakes has submitted two updates to the 2015 study which included cost updates and partnership with New Madison for waste water treatment. Mr. Lindsay then shared technical, finance and administrative progress made by the Village of Wayne Lakes. He also provided information regarding public involvement and stated the 30-day comment period runs from October 25 through November 23 and a complete Public Involvement Summary will be developed at the conclusion of the comment period. He then opened the floor for questions and addressed public comments made during the comment period. Lastly, Mr. Lindsay stated that staff recommends forwarding the Resolution amending the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan for a new rural sanitary sewer system to the Board of Directors.

Ms. Kellum made a motion to recommend forwarding to the Board of Directors for adoption. Mr. Turnbull seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

### V. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

### A. SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #14

Mr. Arnold referred to the 14th amendment to the SFY 2021-2024 TIP and the numerous project changes made by MVRPC and ODOT. He referred to the packet showing the tables broken down by county, as well as the statewide line item project tables. Mr. Arnold stated that staff recommends forwarding Amendment #14 to the SFY 2021-SFY 2024 Transportation Improvement Program to the Board of Directors.

Mr. Brozowski made a motion to recommend forwarding to the Board of Directors for adoption. Mr. Norton seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

### V. INFORMATION ITEMS

### A. Proposed New Projects Requesting MVRPC's STP, CRRSAA & TA Funds

Mr. Arnold presented the proposed new projects requesting MVRPC's STP, CRRSAA and TA Funds. He referred to the table showing all proposed new projects received as part of the

solicitation for MVRPC regionally controlled funding under the Surface Transportation Program (STP), Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) and Transportation Alternatives (TA) programs. He shared a table with the amount of funds requested and the amount of total project costs broken down by each funding category. He also provided information on the public involvement meeting and provided the public comments in the meeting packet. Lastly, Mr. Arnold stated the next step in the process is to evaluate each proposed project based on the criteria established in MVRPC's STP/CMAQ/TA Policies and Procedures. After each project is ranked, a final list of recommended projects will be reviewed by the Technical Advisory Committee in February and then forwarded to the Board of Directors for final approval in March. (Mr. Arnold then opened the floor for questions and addressed using STP, TA and, CRRSAA funds for projects.)

# **B.** Going Places Implementation Tools Progress Update

Mr. Kim provided a progress update regarding the Going Places Implementation Tools. He shared the MVRPC Community Plans page featured on the website where members can learn about services provided to MVRPC members and the diverse types of projects MVRPC has participated in. Examples include: project design, hosting interactive workshops with community leaders, and data compilation-analysis and visualization. Mr. Kim also stated MVRPC is a Census Affiliate Organization, and provides assistance to the U.S. Census Bureau's various programs including the most recent 2020 Census. He shared the Census Data Center Resource page on MVRPC's website to view the most recent Census data updates including the Jurisdiction and County counts and change data. Mr. Kim then shared information regarding the Miami Valley Geo-Spark and explained the Geo-Spark is the Miami Valley's central location for open data and interactive maps including MVRPC's D-Hive a new data management and visualization system that takes advantage of a hexagonal cell pattern to integrate and combine different layers of regional geographic information. Lastly, Mr. Kim shared the Planning Tools page on MVRPC's website and explained this page provides planning practitioners with a range of tools, resources, and best practices to enhance planning outcomes. The planning tools are categorized into three categories: plan development and resources, plan by subject, and plan implementation. Mr. Kim then opened the floor for questions.

**WHEREAS**, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP amendment; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

**WHEREAS**, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2021-SFY2024 TIP; and

**WHEREAS**, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #15** to the <u>SFY2021-SFY2024 Transportation Improvement Program</u> as shown on the attached TIP Tables.

Advocacy Committee (PDAC) Projects

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is working with other organizations throughout the Miami Valley to identify projects that may be eligible for funding. This group, the Dayton Region Priority Development and Advocacy Committee, has developed a process for soliciting projects for consideration of funding through the legislative process. Through a committee decision, the top projects are forwarded on to elected officials for deliberation.

MVRPC is the lead agency for Transportation projects, which include any surface, air, rail, transit, and pedestrian transportation-related projects. Six FY2023 PDAC Transportation project applications, requesting \$7 million, were received by the deadline of November 5, 2021 (see attached Exhibit 2).

MVRPC is also the lead agency for Government Services projects, which include any emergency services, criminal justice, first responders, community and neighborhood infrastructure and K-12 education-related projects. Four FY2023 PDAC Government Services project applications, requesting \$7.8 million, were received by the deadline of November 5, 2021 (see attached Exhibit 3).

The Transportation and Government Services projects were evaluated by a review panel on January 5, 2022. The Project Evaluation System (PES) criteria used to score the Transportation and Government Services applications can be found at:

http://mvrpc.org/transportation/financing/pdac. The Review Panel then categorized the projects into Priority, Recommended, and Reviewed.

The MVRPC Review Panel is submitting six Transportation "Traditional" (Roadway)/"Non-Traditional" (Bikeway) projects and four Government Services projects for submittal to the Dayton Region Priority Development and Advocacy Committee in categorized order as shown in Exhibit 1. A resolution endorsing these recommendations is attached for your consideration.

The list of projects is now being sent to the MVRPC Board structure for final review and adoption and submittal to the Dayton Region Priority Development and Advocacy Committee.




# Planning and GIS Services to Continue in Year 2022

# MiamiValleyRoads.org

MVRPC created <u>MiamiValleyRoads.org</u> to provide updates on major construction projects that could impact commutes throughout the Region. It also provides user-friendly access to route planning tools, commute solutions and other ideas to reduce congestion and prevent air pollution for the areas under construction.

The construction project to repair the I-75 bridges over Edwin C. Moses Boulevard and Carillon Boulevard near the Great Miami River in Dayton continues. This project is expected to be completed in the Fall of 2022. Below are the areas that are currently closed or experiencing traffic pattern

shifts:

- I-75 southbound and northbound will experience nightly lane width restrictions and multiple lane closures, between Albany Street and S.R. 741.
- A traffic pattern shift on I-75 northbound between Albany Street and State Route 741 (Springboro Pike) continues through Friday, September 2, 2022. The far-left 11' lane will shift onto I-75 southbound from SR 741 (Springboro Pike) in Moraine then shift back at Stewart St. There will be two 11' side-by-side thru-lanes on I-75 northbound next to the median wall. \*Drivers will need to stay in the two right lanes of I-75 northbound to access the Edwin C. Moses Blvd. exit and the U.S. 35 exits.\*

ODOT's SRTS program is a reimbursement program that can provide up to 100% reimbursement for eligible activities utilizing federal funding. Funding is prioritized in communities who demonstrate high need, and for projects that demonstrate high student impact and improved safety and connectivity for students walking and biking.

The SRTS Program is accepting applications for:

- Infrastructure Projects (engineering solutions within 2 miles of school)
- Non-Infrastructure Projects (education, encouragement, enforcement, evaluation, or other programming related to enabling or encouraging kids to walk and bike to school)
- School Travel Plan Development Assistance (requesting reimbursement or consultant assistance with developing a School Travel Plan in your community).
