### IV. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

### A. Recommende Adoption of Amendment to MVRPC's SFY2014-2017 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to a memo on page 4 of the mailout explaining that numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects has resulted in the need for a TIP amendment. He referred to the project tables for each county as well as the areawide projects. Mr. Arnold stated that staff does recommend adoption of this TIP amendment, and referred to a resolution on page 11 of the mailout. Mr.. Amrhein made a motion to recommend adoption. Mr. Huelskamp seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### V. INFORMATION ITEMS

### A. Update on FY2015 Dayton Development Coalition's Priority Development and Advocacy Committee (PDAC) Solicitation.

Mr. Daniel referred to a memo on page 12 of the mailout explaining that MVRPC is working with other organizations throughout the Miami Valley to identify projects that may be eligible for funding. Staff will be working with the Dayton Regional Priority Development and Advocacy Committee, which has developed a process to evaluate projects and establish a list of regional priorities and recommended projects that aids the community in speaking with one voice when pursuing funding opportunities. Solicitation for new projects will start October 16th, and through a committee decision, the top projects will be forwarded on to pursue funding opportunities. He reported that MVRPC is the lead agency for Transportation projects and Government Services projects. Transportation projects include any surface, air, rail, transit, and pedestrian transportation-related projects. Government Services projects include any criminal justice, first responders, community and neighborhood infrastructure, and K-12 education projects. Mr. Daniel referred to the list of recommended priorities on page 13 which will be presented before the MVRPC Board for final review and adoption and submittal to the Dayton Regional Priority Development and Advocacy Committee.

### B. Water Quality Credit Trading Program.

Sarah Hippensteel Hall introduced the Great Miami Water Quality Credit Trading program. Dr. Hall provided some statistics about the Great Miami watershed: it covers all or part of 15 counties and 70% of the land use is agricultural. She highlighted recent news coverage of algae blooms in the state of Ohio, including recent coverage of Toledo's drinking water emergency and Grand Lake St. Mary's. The current science is looking at the flow of "nutrients" into the waterways, meaning phosphorus and nitrogen as a cause of these issues. Dr. Hall explained how these nutrients flow off of both urban and rural land, but with 70% of our land in agriculture, it is assumed that agriculture-related runoff is a significant portion of the problem. Also, streams that are not meeting Ohio EPA's water quality standards in this watershed tend to be in the headwater areas, outside of the urban areas. Dr. Hall stated that the water quality credit trading program was piloted by the Miami Conservancy District in partnership with six founding investors to demonstrate a more cost effective investment approach to reducing nutrients in the rivers in the watershed. The project uses investments from Wastewater Treatment plant (WWTP) operators to fund proven practices in agricultural areas to reduce and filter runoff from agricultural land. Through ten rounds of funding, the cost per pound of nutrients abated is about \$1.48, a fraction of the cost of technological upgrades to WWTP. Dr. Hall reported that currently, MCD and the founding investors are in discussion with Ohio EPA to ensure that this strategy may be used by WWTPs to meet the nutrient reduction goals in their water quality permits.

### VI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Ms. Ramirez referred to the September Executive Director's Report on page 14 of the mailout. The report provided a list of MVRPC funded projects that are scheduled to be completed by the end of 2014; it summarized an update of the upcoming move of MVRPC administrative offices and also provided a list of upcoming meetings. These meetings include an instructional seminar for STP/CMAQ and TA projects immediately after the TAC and the Dayton Regional Green Roundtable following the seminar.

#### VII. ADJOURN

Mr. Thuma made a motion to adjourn. Mr. Ecklar seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Subject: Water Quality Credit Trading

This memo provides basic information and a staff recommendation related to the resolution in support of Water Quality Credit Trading programs.

### **Background**

In 2004 The Miami Conservancy District, in partnership with local communities, launched a pilot program to explore an innovative way to finance design and installation of agricultural best practices to prevent runoff of nutrient pollution (phosphorus and nitrogen) into streams within the Great Miami River watershed. The simple logic behind the project was based on the high cost of nutrient removal technologies designed for use at publicly owned wastewater treatment plants (WWTP). The pilot was set up to answer this question: Could nutrient pollution be prevented from entering the Great Miami River, for less cost than the WWTP technologies, by funding agricultural best practices up stream? If the answer were "yes" then this approach could represent a lower cost compliance strategy for WWTP facing new nutrient limits in their water discharge permits.

An extensive process of stakeholder involvement resulted in Ohio EPA's endorsement of the Water Quality Credit Trading operations manual. Seven communities stepped forward as "founding investors" to contribute dollars that would fund projects in the watershed on agricultural operations to reduce runoff to streams. MCD also received other grants to supplement these funds. The projects are reviewed by a broad committee of stakeholders and funded using a reverse auction market that selects the lowest cost per pound projects first, moving on to higher cost projects until each round's funds are allocated.

Installed projects are inspected by Soil and Water Conservation Districts and ODNR to ensure they function as intended and are properly maintained. Once in place the projects generate "credits" based on the calculated reductions in nutrient runoff. It is these credits the founding investors would hope to use to demonstrate compliance with nutrient limits in their water discharge permit

### Results

In all, MCD has conducted 11 rounds within the pilot program, funding 397 projects in the watershed at a cost of just under \$1.7 million. The projects are calculated to prevent 572 tons of nutrient runoff for an average cost per pound of \$1.48. This is significantly below the estimated \$9.00 per pound for the WWTP technologies needed to remove nutrients.

In addition to the cost effectiveness, the program has additional environmental benefits, such as habitat restoration, wetland and floodplain restoration and protection, and hydrologic improvements (stream bank improvements, reduced velocity). By their nature the improvements in nutrient loadings are in the headwater areas of the watershed, where the agricultural land is located, and also where the majority of the sources of nutrient loadings originate. These benefits would not accrue from a technology-only approach to nutrient reduction.

### Credit Trading in the Miami Valley 208 Plan

The current text of the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan for the Miami Valley (AWQMP) contains permissive language regarding credit trading programs. The plan states that credit trading programs approved by Ohio EPA shall be regarded as consistent with the 208 Plan. This language was chosen not to encourage or discourage use of the credit trading approach, but simply to eliminate any doubt about whether they are allowed under the AWQMP.

### Next Steps

MCD, the founding investors, and others are interested in formalizing the water quality credit trading approach as a compliance strategy for meeting nutrient limits in water discharge permits. However, to date, Ohio EPA staff has been reluctant to include this approach in the toolbox of strategies they will make available to permit holders in the Great Miami River watershed. MCD and other interested parties have engaged Ohio EPA in a series of meetings and discussions to try to reach an agreement on this issue.

The purpose of this MVRPC resolution is to express to Ohio EPA the support of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission for inclusion of this cost-effective strategy as an approach for reducing nutrient pollution in the waters of the State of Ohio. The staff recommends adoption of the resolution.



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### **RESOLUTION SUPPORTING WATER QUALITY CREDIT TRADING** PROGRAMS AS A WATER QUALITY PROTECTION STRATEGY

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as Areawide Water Quality Management Agency by the Governor of Ohio for Darke, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, and Preble Counties: and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the agency's water quality planning process for the planning area; and

WHEREAS, protecting, preserving, and promoting the quality of water in the Great Miami River Watershed (Watershed) is vital to public health and the economic sustainability of every community within the Watershed; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency is preparing to implement new requirements to further enhance water quality within the Watershed and across the state; and

WHEREAS, publicly-owned wastewater treatment plants are potentially facing significant costs to meet the new requirements; and

WHEREAS, at the request of communities within the Watershed, the Miami Conservancy District developed the Great Miami River Watershed Water Quality Credit Trading Program (Program), an innovative market-based approach, to cost-effectively enhance water quality within the Watershed; and

WHEREAS, on April 25, 2005 the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Division of Surface Water endorsed the Operations Manual for the Program; and

WHEREAS, the Areawide Water Quality Management Plan for the Miami Valley (208 Plan) allows for the operation of water quality credit trading programs, when approved by Ohio EPA; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC supports holistic watershed-wide approaches to enhancing water quality including water quality credit trading as an option to address permit limits

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission urges the Director of Ohio EPA to allow use of programs structured like the Great Miami River Watershed Water Quality Credit Trading Program as a part of the permit compliance strategy of publicly owned wastewater treatment plants as they address nutrient discharge into the waters of the state.

Subject: Surface Transportation Program Loan to the County Engineers Association of Ohio

The federal funds allocation process allows for transfers among metropolitan planning organizations, large cities outside of MPOs and the County Engineers Association of Ohio (CEAO) on an as needed basis. Recently, we received a formal request from the CEAO for a \$4,000,000 loan from MVRPC for SFY2015 Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds with repayment in SFY2016 (July 1, 2015).

The purpose of the loan would be to advance a Miami County Engineer's project, currently funded by CEAO, from SFY2016 into SFY2015 in order to complete the project with an adjacent project funded by MVRPC in one construction season. CEAO currently has a projected deficit in SFY2015, and without approval of this loan, would not be able to accommodate the Miami County Engineer's request.

Staff is recommending authorization to loan \$4,000,000 of MVRPC SFY2015 STP funds to the CEAO with repayment in SFY2016. The proposed loan would be a benefit to the MVRPC Region as it would reduce the amount of STP surplus in SFY2015 which is subject to ODOT's Carryover Reduction Policy adopted in 2012. A resolution authorizing the requested loan is attached for your review and consideration. MVRPC staff recommends your approval.

**WHEREAS**, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Carlisle, Franklin and Springboro in Warren County; and

**WHEREAS**, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning process for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

**WHEREAS**, all Federally funded transit and highway improvements within Greene, Miami and Montgomery Counties must be included in the region's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) prior to the expenditure of Federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the SFY2014-SFY2017 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 2, 2013; and

**WHEREAS**, the ODOT federal fund allocation process allows for loans to other MPOs, large cities and the CEAO receiving ODOT suballocated funds on an as needed basis; and

**WHEREAS**, the CEAO has requested a \$4,000,000 loan from MVRPC for SFY2015 Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds with repayment in SFY2016 (July 1, 2015); and

WHEREAS, due to STP funded project delays, MVRPC has surplus STP funds available in SFY2015.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby authorizes the Executive Director to enter into agreement with the CEAO to loan SFY2015 STP funds in the amount of \$4,000,000 with repayment in SFY2016.

**WHEREAS**, the SFY2014-SFY2017 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 2, 2013; and

**WHEREAS**, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2014-SFY2017 TIP amendment; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

**WHEREAS**, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2014-SFY2017 TIP: and

**WHEREAS**, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #15** to the <u>SFY2014-SFY2017 Transportation</u> Improvement Program as shown on the attached TIP Tables.

Subject: Proposed New Projects Requesting MVRPC's STP, CMAQ and TA Funds

The enclosed table shows all proposed new projects received as part of our solicitation for MVRPC regionally controlled funding under the Surface Transportation Program (STP), Congestion Management/Air Quality (CMAQ) and Transportation Alternatives (TA) programs.

Federal funding request totals and total project costs are broken down by funding category below.

# Moving Ahead

### October 2, 2014 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### 1. Miami Valley wins GIS Mapping Awards

The Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) is proud to announce receiving two (2) awards in the Map Gallery Competition during the 2014 Ohio Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Conference. The 2014 Miami Valley Bikeways Guide Map received the "First Place Award" in the Reference Map Category. Also, it received the "Best of Show Award" which was presented to the entry that received the highest overall score among all entries for all categories. Additionally, the City of Centerville received the 2014 Ohio GIS Best Practices Award in recognition of their GIS program. The awards were presented at the 2014 Ohio GIS Conference held September 22 – 24.

The 2014 Miami Valley Bikeways Guide Map was a collaborative effort led by MVRPC. Multiple trail-managing agencies, map sponsors and trail users had input into the map and reviewed and commented on drafts created by MVRPC staff. Schlegel Creative Resources was responsible for final layout and design. Cox Media Group (Ohio) was the "presenting sponsor" of the map.

#### 2. SW Ohio TRAC Presentations

The Springfield and Dayton Regions made their case to the statewide committee. Thank you to the ODOT Districts and local sponsors for their presentations. A special thanks to all who were in attendance in support of the Region's projects: I-70 widening, US 35 (Montgomery & Greene), and I-70 Airport Logistics Park.

#### 3. Administrative Office Move to Suite 700, 10 N. Ludlow Street

We are truly "Moving Ahead" with our move in less than 3 weeks! All readers of this report should have received an email distribution on Monday, September 29 detailing the move and the tentative mid – October date for occupancy in the new space. An additional round of press releases and post cards will be distributed on October 15 if all work is completed by October 14. As of today, only the construction of the wall and the internet installation tasks <u>could</u> delay the desired occupancy date of October 20. The Lessor's contractor has started work on the wall which will separate the MVRPC office space from the former tenant's offices on floors 5 and 6. The internet contractor is coordinating with us to complete their work by October 17.

The MVRPC office contractor's work will be substantially completed by Friday Oct. 2. We are managing this risk and anticipate that the move will occur as scheduled with the physical move of items October 17 & 18 and occupancy on October 20.

#### 4. Regional Planning Update

Following the approval of the Going Places planning process and the 11 implementation tools in April, staff has made several advancements which are summarized below.

### Tool A: Shared Regional Geographic Information System (GIS)

- Staff released a new gateway web page to provide enhanced data access at a central location with updated GIS resources. GIS data and web maps available for member organizations cover demographic, transportation, environmental, land use, and boundary information.
- Staff is working with several members to leverage MVRPC's GIS capacity and provide enhanced GIS services. Examples include zoning data updates for Miami County and City of Clayton through web-based GIS.

### Tool D: Series of Regional Assets and Economic Analysis

- Staff updated its regional demographic profile using the latest U.S. Census data. Information
  pertaining to residents' educational attainment, home ownership, and income are available to
  member organizations though maps and data tables.
- Staff released new regional employment profile using U.S. Census employment statistics. This
  profile provides maps showing information such as concentration of jobs, concentration of
  employment by industry sector, earnings, and educational attainment level.
- Staff is working with several partners on regional asset mapping. Examples include river corridor asset web mapping with Miami Conservancy District and environmental related data compilation with Greater Dayton Partners for the Environment.

### Tool I: Innovative Solutions for Sustainable Development and Redevelopment

 Staff provided planning process consultation to assist member planning efforts in City of Trotwood, Beavercreek Twp., Jefferson Twp., and City of Dayton.

#### Tool J: Innovative Solutions for Natural Resources Preservation and Enhancement

Staff assisted Greater Dayton Partners for the Environment to regenerate and publicize 1997
 Miami Valley Wetland Inventory data through web mapping application.

#### Tool K: Miami Valley Story Project for More Meaningful Regional Marketing and Increase Local Tourism

• Staff is working in partnership with young professional volunteers from UpDayton on the new regional campaign titled "Dayton Inspires," which was launched in May.
