I. INTRODUCTION

Chair Huelskamp called the meeting to order. Self-introductions were made.

II. APPROVAL OF APRIL 21, 2016 MEETING MINUTES

Ms. Rhoades made a motion to approve minutes. Mr. Donnelly seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

III. Public Comment Period on Action Items

None

IV. MPO (METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION) ACTION ITEMS

A. Recommended Adoption of Amendment to MVRPC's SFY2016-2019 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Arnold referred to a memo on page 4 of the mailout explaining that numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects has resulted in the need for a TIP amendment. He referred to the project tables for each county as well as the statewide line item projects.

Mr. Arnold stated that staff does recommend adoption of this TIP amendment, and referred to a resolution on page 37 of the mailout. Mr. Geyer made a motion to recommend adoption. Mr. Hammes seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

V. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. National Highway System (NHS) – MAP 21 Additions

Ms. Ramirez provided an overview of the Functional Class System explaining it is updated every 10 years, the Board approved recommended changes in May 2014 and MVRPC and ODOT agree on Functional Class Designations. However, ODOT has proposed to remove MAP-21 additions to the NHS and this issue needs to be resolved before FHWA will issue statewide approval of functional class. Ms. Ramirez reviewed a list of recent changes to the National Highway System (NHS) and reviewed a map of the expanded NHS. She also explained some final changes in NHS standards which will mean less design exceptions. Ms. Ramirez also reviewed a map illustrating NHS versus the National Network, explaining there is some overlap but not the same set of rules. MVRPC will recommend to ODOT and FHWA that the Map-21 additions to the NHS, remain on the NHS for the MVRPC area.

B. Going Places Implementation Tools Progress Update

Mr. Kim reported that staff has been providing numerous services to our Members such as Community Planning Support Services, Best Practices Research Services and GIS Services. He stated that the subject for today's briefing is implementation tools for economic development. Mr. Kim provided details for each of the following implementation tools for economic development efforts;

- Tool A Shared Regional GIS
- Tool B Data support for the Economic Development Site Selection Database
- Tool E Project Funding Competitive Analysis

Mr. Kim included a review of the JobsOhio website which provides a tool designed to find the Ohio location that meets specific business needs. The website provides economic, geographic, demographic and other data needed to make an informed decision when selecting a business location. Mr. Kim announced that the 2016 Regional Economic Development Summit will be held on Thursday, May 26 at Sinclair College and MVRPC will be having as session on the implementation tools. C. Update on Share the Road Initiatives

Ms. Frank Hoppe reminded the Board that "Share the Road" materials, aimed at bicyclists and motorists, were available to the communities to brand and put to their own uses. She also shared the "Tale of the Trails" infographic handout which is newly published this month and tells folks about the great amenities and assets available on our Regional Trail Network. The information was collected as part of the trail survey effort in 2013, so the handout will serve as both a promotional item for upcoming trail events and a recruitment tool for the 2017 survey.

Ms. Frank Hoppe gave a presentation on the Street Smart Pedestrian Safety Campaign, which MVRPC is sponsoring in our region starting this June. The new Street Smart Campaign is meant to reduce the crash rate through increased awareness, encouraging drivers to watch out for pedestrians, and encouraging pedestrians to walk defensively. The "Tired Faces" campaign is adapted from a similar campaign created in the D.C. area. Even though the risks of walking are statistically small, they are significant, and the national pedestrian crash rate is rising by 10% each year.

She explained that the rate of increase is even higher in Ohio, and while 1 percent of crashes involve pedestrians, they are very likely to cause a serious injury or fatality. Ms. Frank Hoppe stated that the prevalence of crashes that take place in the evening and at night, and particularly in late fall and winter, reinforces the need to wear light colored and reflective clothing and coats. Speed also plays a role in pedestrian-motor vehicle crashes and increases the injury potential exponentially. She explained that many pedestrian fatalities involve alcohol or drugs – either the driver or the walker is under the influence. Many, but not all, fatalities are outside of crosswalks – places where drivers don't expect somebody to be walking. Finally, the health benefits of walking and biking far outweigh the dangers. While fatal accidents make the news, individual deaths from heart disease and diabetes usually don't. As a community, we need to walk and bike more, but we should do it safely.

VI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Martin referred to his May report on page 38 of the mailout. He thanked Kjirsten for her presentation which also coordinated well with May being National Bike Month. He also reported that the Annual Dinner was held on April 14th, and was a very well attended event, and Mark Donaghy from GDRTA was the recipient of the Regional Steward Award. Mr. Martin provided updates on an areawide meeting with OEPA Director Craig Butler as well as information on grant and funding resources. He also reported there are several new outreach commercials currently airing on TV as well as the website. Staff is also promoting a new pedestrian safety campaign called Street Smarts. His report also provided a list of upcoming meetings.

VII. ADJOURN

Mr. Geyer made a motion to adjourn. Mr. Conway seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

WHEREAS, the SFY2016-SFY2019 Transportation Improvement Program was adopted on May 7, 2015; and

WHEREAS, MVRPC and ODOT have made numerous modifications to the programming documents for various projects resulting in the need for a SFY2016-SFY2019 TIP amendment; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Region's long-range transportation plan; and

WHEREAS, this TIP amendment will not affect the regional air quality emission analysis of the SFY2016-SFY2019 TIP; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC Public Participation Policy for Transportation Planning process allows for minor TIP amendments such as this to occur without separate public involvement meetings; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that is in reasonable fiscal constraint

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby adopts **Amendment #11** to the <u>SFY2016-SFY2019 Transportation Improvement Program</u> as shown on the attached TIP Tables.

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RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION COORDINATION AND PLANNING AREA REFORM RULE

WHEREAS, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governor acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation in cooperation with locally elected officials for Greene, Miami, and Montgomery Counties including the jurisdictions of Franklin, Carlisle, and Springboro in Warren County; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Transportation has proposed the MPO Coordination and Planning Area Reform as published in the Federal Register on Monday June 27, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the rule would require that a Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) include at a minimum the entire urbanized area and the contiguous area expected to become urbanized within a 20-year forecast period; and

WHEREAS, the proposed rule establishes certain requirements for instances where an Urbanized Area expands to multiple MPAs shall combine planning documents for the entire Urbanized Area; and

WHEREAS, it has been found that if adopted, the Dayton MPA and neighboring Springfield and Cincinnati MPAs would be affected by this rule; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC's Board of Directors serves as the policy and decision making body through which local governments guide the MPO's transportation planning for the Dayton Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, the MVRPC believes that the current MPA delineations in Ohio has resulted in logical regional geographies that are able to serve and represent their respective urbanized areas well by providing transportation plans, funding, and other planning products that are tailored to the needs of the current communities and their unique economies while reflecting regional priorities; and

WHEREAS, existing processes are in place including interagency consultation agreements, and planning cooperative agreements with adjacent and nearby MPOs that ensure coordination of transportation issues and projects on adjoining boundary areas; and

WHEREAS, the Commission strongly believes that relying solely on the urbanized area boundaries as the controlling factor to draw MPA boundaries results in boundaries which are subject to change with every decennial census and would ignore other relevant economic and geographic boundaries that are important regionally and locally; and

WHEREAS, the proposed rule's aim seems to be MPO consolidation leading to the creation of large MPOs encompassing multiple urbanized areas; and

WHEREAS, in Ohio, an MPO serving multiple large urbanized areas would decrease the local involvement and participation that is the hallmark of the MPO governance structure in place in Ohio; and

WHEREAS, each individual Region has considerable differences in transportation needs, economic bases, and local identity; and

WHEREAS, none of the scenarios proposed in the rule are acceptable to MVRPC.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission hereby opposes the Metropolitan Planning Organization Coordination and Planning Area Reform Rule.

Subject: CY2016 TRAC Applications Submitted within the MVRPC Region.

Solicitation for ODOT Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) projects began on June 1, 2016. As of the June 30th application deadline, MVRPC received two applications, which include:

<u>Project</u> <u>Sponsor</u> <u>\$ Requested</u>

1. <u>Greene US 35 Superstreets</u> <u>ODOT D-8 / Beavercreek/</u> <u>\$5.0 mil</u> Project <u>Greene County/</u>

Beavercreek Township

As an interim measure to address congestion/safety concerns at the Factory Road and Orchard Lane intersections, District 8 is proposing to develop superstreet intersections at these two locations. The proposed interchange project is still under development and is utilizing remaining earmark funding for Right of Way Plan design. District is also proposing to split the Factory/Orchard and New Germany-Trebein future interchanges into separate projects.

2. Montgomery US 35 Improvements ODOT D-7 \$27.58 mil

This project will consist of major pavement rehabilitation of the existing US 35 mainline and include construction of an additional lane in each direction from Livingston Avenue, just west of Smithville Road, to the Montgomery/Greene County Line.

MVRPC staff started reviewing these prospective projects on June 30th. Staff will release the draft rankings to the project sponsors by the end of July. MVRPC staff will be hosting a Project Sponsor Meeting in the beginning of August at MVRPC's main office. The purpose of this Project Sponsor meeting will be to answer any questions or discuss any discrepancies between the project sponsor and staff scoring, and to reach a consensus. The final project scores and rankings will be presented to the MVRPC Board of Directors on October 6th for adoption. Following the ranking of the projects, MVRPC staff and the project sponsors will prepare for the TRAC Public Hearing that will be held October 13th at ODOT Central. 
The Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) will accept 2016 funding applications June 1 through June 30, 2016. The online application will be available at the TRAC website (http://www.dot.state.oh.us/trac/Pages/Default.aspx). Realizing the importance of transportation investments and mindful of maximizing the limited amount of transportation dollars available versus the potential project needs, TRAC will consider projects that meet one of the following criteria:

- The project is an existing TRAC funded project (Tier I, II or III) and additional funds are needed to advance the project to the next stage of development.
- A new project with construction cost above \$12M that demonstrates significant impact to jobs, regional economic impact and has significant non-ODOT funding commitments.

Extra consideration will be given to projects with non-ODOT funding commitments in the amount of <u>30%</u> or greater of the total project cost.

These compelling visual ads are designed to remind motorists and pedestrians what they must do to be "street smart" and safe. The ads are located along arterial roadways in the Miami Valley that have higher vehicle, transit, and pedestrian traffic. The ads were first developed in the Washington, D.C. Metro area and are aimed at motorists and pedestrians alike.

Since every trip begins or ends with walking, it is important to everyone to be street smart and safe at all times. The MVRPC website (http://www.mvrpc.org/street-smart) includes the following reminders:

- If there is a sidewalk, use it. If you must walk in the street, walk on the left FACING TRAFFIC.
- Wear light-colored or reflective clothing at night, or at dawn or dusk.
- If you regularly walk or jog at night, consider wearing lights. Or just carry a flashlight.
- If there is a crosswalk, use it.
- Even if it is your turn to cross at a light, make eye contact with any approaching vehicles.
- Don't walk distracted; look up from your phone when crossing a street, or better still, put it away entirely when walking.
- Remember, driving under the influence can be fatal. So can walking under the influence.
